| Target Behavior (Eating): Nick and other kids in his school and community overconsume sweetened beverages | |

| Built Environment | Sweetened beverages are widely available in vending machines in schools. Convenience stores selling sweetened beverages are nearby. |
| Social Environment | Ads for sweetened beverages are widespread. Drinking sweetened beverages, especially soda, is seen as "cool" by peers. |
| Economic Environment | Vending machines provide needed revenue for schools. Kids have money to buy drinks at school. |
| Policy Environment | Federal school regulations allow noncarbonated sweetened beverages to be sold all day and sodas for much of the day. |

Target Behavior (Activity): Miguel and other kids in his neighborhood don't walk to school

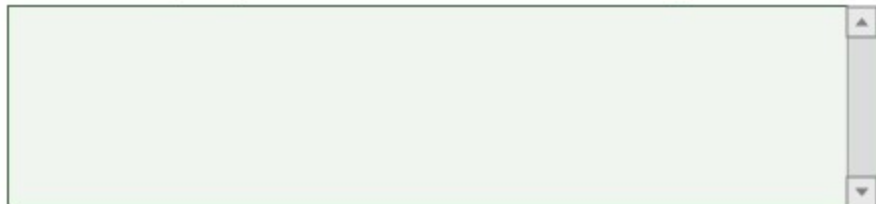
Eating-related: sweetened beverages are widely available in vending machines in school

Activity-related: neighborhood is not very "walkable."

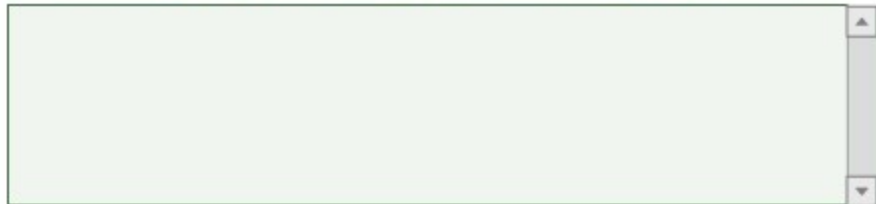
2c Identify what data collection methods, tools, and strategies you could use to gather information that would help you assess how these environmental factors are affecting behavior and how much they are affecting it.

For some suggested tools, go to **Tools for You** on the Cornell NutritionWorks website; the tools listed in the examples below are available there. You should practice using at least one of these tools to assess one of the environmental factors you have identified.

Tools to assess priority environmental factor related to **activity** behavior:



Examples: Tools Anita's team might use to assess the availability of sweetened beverages in vending machines in Nick's school: **CDC's School Health Index**, the **Vending Machine Checklist** from **CSPI**, **Interviews with key school personnel**.

Tools Anita's team might use to assess the walkability of Miguel's neighborhood: **Walkability Checklist** and the **Physical Activity Facilities Survey**.



- 2d** Draft measurable objectives to change each of the environmental factors you have prioritized above. Once you have collected your data, your objectives or even your selected environmental factor might need to change. (For example, in the case study, Anita's group had to shift their focus from lack of sidewalks to a dangerous intersection after their assessment of Miguel's neighborhood.) However, these draft objectives will help guide your planning now.

Examples: Anita and her team's objective to address her priority environmental factor related to eating behavior:

Decrease by 30% the number of sweetened beverages available in vending machines in Baker Middle School in two years.

Anita and her team's objective to address her priority environmental factor related to activity behavior:

Increase by 20% the walkability score of the neighborhood near Pleasantville Middle School by the end of the next school year.
